As you may or may not know, Zimbabwe is continuing to face a severe financial crisis. The country is experiencing intensifying political and economic unrest and most Zimbabweans are struggling to afford some of the most basic goods and services. Today, basic staples cost upwards of \$20, when a mere year ago they were available for \$3. A box of tissues costs \$7.15 and there is a ration of one can of baby formula per purchase. Many gas stations are out of fuel and supplies and services are getting harder and harder to come by.

It is times like these that we are reminded of the strength, faith and unfathomable tenacity that Zimbabweans exhibit on a daily basis. We are forever thankful for the strength and service that Fairfield's Staff, Mothers and Aunties give to the children each and every day. We are both humbled and honored to be a part of this mission, and we are forever grateful for every sponsor that has joined us.

This September our 12 board members will meet in Denver for our annual Board Meeting. Every year we discuss our successes, our challenges, and brainstorm ways that we can better serve the needs of the children. I would want to start by expressing my gratitude, joy and appreciation over all what you been doing for me from a world away. Being able to attend University these days in Zimbabwe is rare, the economy is bad and the prices are constantly increasing. I really recognize your efforts and will continue to be dedicated and do my best because I believe you are also working hard to raise such money for my fees.

In March 2017, I started my tertiary education at Africa University, having being enrolled as a Medical Laboratory Science student. I do enjoy the classes and have big hopes in this medical field. Recently I submitted a project proposal on the effectiveness of Biomarkers in early cancer detection, which I will undertake during my attachment. Though this is a school requirement, I am sure I will enjoy this project and trying to understand and to increase cancer knowledge since it has claimed, and still continues, to claim lives. Our academic calendar has 2 semesters per year, so I have completed my first semester of my third academic year. This will be followed by a 3 month winter break (May - July) and will resume school in August, going on attachment for the whole year. I will be working in the second largest public hospital lab in the country - in Bulawayo.

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It is my aim to give, show love and care for others just as you are doing to me.

I am finishing my university studies in December 2020 but will graduate in June the following year. Despite the salary being low in Zimbabwe, I am proud of doing medical lab science. In Zimbabwe, with the country's unemployment rate being estimated to be over 90%, getting a job in this area is not as difficult as other areas, so I do hope I will get one.

My future plans after school: Soon after my undergrad degree, I aspire to work and gain experience for about 2 years, working in the field then hope to be back to school for my masters study. I have still yet to decide on the medical laboratory disciple I will major in. This will be at a different university or even outside Zimbabwe or Africa. The idea of working back for masters is to have a deep understanding of my field with hands on the ground. From those I have consulted, many do say that pursuing learning at a young age plus after being exposed to the real work environment is an aided advantage since it increases more understanding when doing masters. In the end, I aspire to work at continental level or working for an international organization.

When I was a first year student, I was in the school choir and hockey was my sport of choice. However, as courses mount, pressure increased, schooling became tough and time for that became limited so I later dropped everything.
